## Afghanistan Achieves Full Self-Sufficiency in 130 Sectors and Partial Self-Sufficiency in 100 Sectors



#### Introduction

Since the re-establishment of the Islamic Emirate in Afghanistan, nationwide security and stability have been established, which has resulted in the expansion of economic activities, the strengthening of industry, and a reduction in unemployment.

Currently, around 6,000 industrial factories are officially operating in the country, enabling Afghanistan to achieve full self-sufficiency in 130 sectors and partial self-sufficiency in 100 sectors. These factories produce approximately 570 types of goods, including flour, cooking oil, salt, medicine, iron, cement, steel, chemical products, consumer goods, and others. Around 135,000 citizens are directly employed in these factories.

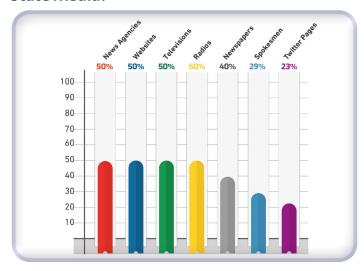
To support the growth of industry, the Islamic Emirate has provided various facilities for industrialists. Examples include the allocation of industrial land, provision of raw materials, reduction of import tariffs, prevention of smuggling of factory consumables, increasing tariffs on goods that are domestically produced, and organizing exhibitions both inside and outside the country to promote and strengthen domestic industry.

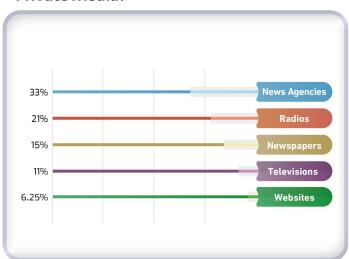

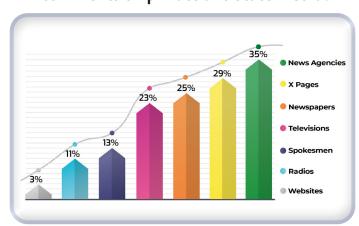

## The collective percentage of people's comments on private and state media:



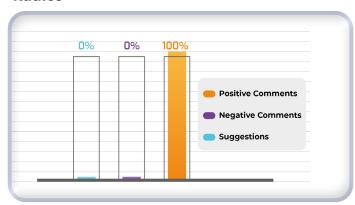

## Analysis and Evaluation of Public Opinions in the Media Regarding the News:

We can divide the media into two types: State-owned Media and Private Media.

## 1. Analysis and Evaluation of Public Opinions in State-owned Media:

The opinions of the public in state-owned media, including television, radio, newspapers, websites, spokespersons, news agencies, and Twitter pages, regarding the news are as follows:

• Total Opinions: 487

• Positive Opinions: 454 (93%)

• Negative Opinions: 22 (4.5%)

• Constructive Suggestions: 11 (2.5%)

### 2. Analysis and Evaluation of Public Opinions in Private Media:

The opinions of the public in private media, including television, radio, newspapers, websites, and news agencies, regarding the news are as follows:

• Total Opinions: 1471

• Positive Opinions: 1050 (71%)

Negative Opinions: 333 (23%)

Constructive Suggestions: 88 (6%)

Considering the above numbers, the percentage of positive opinions is higher in state-owned media compared to private media. State-owned media have 93% positive opinions, whereas private media have 71%. The percentage of negative opinions is higher in private media as state-owned media. When combining positive, negative opinions, and constructive suggestions from both media types, we get a total of 1504 positive opinions, 355 negative opinions, and 99 constructive suggestions, resulting in:

Negative Opinions: 18%

## An Analysis of Public Opinion in the Media and on Social Networks: Key Findings

- > First: A number of citizens have stated in their remarks that even if our country achieves one percent self-sufficiency, it is an accomplishment. Indeed! Every step taken toward national self-sufficiency should be appreciated. The self-sufficiency of countries does not happen overnight; rather, it requires significant time for a nation to achieve it across multiple sectors. It is through small steps that a country reaches great aspirations, and the Islamic Emirate has also begun with small steps, which—God willing—will one day enable our nation to achieve broad self-sufficiency in many areas. The Islamic Emirate is working to restrict the import of those goods for which there is significant domestic production capacity. Although attaining self-sufficiency in every sector is highly challenging, Afghanistan has the capacity to become self-sufficient in a number of areas and even to export to the world. Currently, Afghanistan has already achieved self-sufficiency in some sectors and has exports to other countries. Iron, non-alcoholic beverages, poultry meat, and several other goods are among the products in which our country has reached self-sufficiency, and efforts continue to transform Afghanistan from an import-dependent nation into an export-oriented one. The Islamic Emirate is committed to this transformation and, for that reason, continues to support and facilitate the work of industrialists. We observe that citizens are supportive of every small step taken by the Islamic Emirate in this regard and express satisfaction.
- A number of citizens have commented that people are distressed by **>>** Second: unemployment, and they have called for the creation of jobs to eliminate it. The reality is that unemployment is a problem in the country. The Islamic Emirate acknowledges its existence and does not deny it, but it is also making efforts to reduce unemployment and has taken necessary measures in this regard. We can see that in recent years, with the increase of industrial activity in the country, a number of job opportunities have been created, employing thousands of citizens. To further create employment opportunities, an enabling environment has been provided for private sector investment. For this purpose, security has been ensured, currency stability has been maintained, corruption has been curbed, and transparency has been promoted, so that the private sector is encouraged to invest in Afghanistan. Moreover, to reduce unemployment and create job opportunities, various projects have been launched across different sectors of the country, in which thousands of citizens are employed. These activities have not only reduced unemployment to some extent but have also played an effective role in boosting the country's economic growth. Unemployment is not reduced easily; it requires considerable effort, and the Islamic Emirate is committed to lowering unemployment and providing job opportunities in the country.

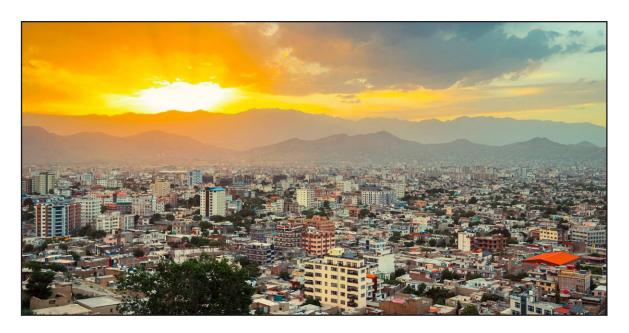
> Third: A number of citizens have expressed that if the electricity problem in the country is solved, 100 percent self-sufficiency could be achieved. Indeed, electricity is vital for the economic growth of any country. It facilitates industrial activity, which in turn creates employment opportunities. In other words, electricity, industrial development, and economic growth are interconnected. Unfortunately, Afghanistan's current electricity supply is insufficient. A limited amount of electricity is produced domestically, which does not meet demand. For this reason, due to the shortage of domestically generated electricity, we remain dependent on imported power. However, the Islamic Emirate, which has a strong determination for the country's comprehensive development, has also taken the electricity shortage into account. Recognizing the essential role of electricity in industrial growth and economic development, the Islamic Emirate is striving to utilize domestic resources for power generation. In recent times, several projects have been launched for the production of solar, wind, and hydropower, which, once completed, will increase the country's electricity capacity. As a result, economic activities will expand, and the level of self-sufficiency will rise.

#### Conclusion

The Islamic Emirate is committed to national self-sufficiency and is making every effort to advance the country toward economic growth and independence. Thus far, several concrete steps have been taken in this regard. The initiation of electricity projects, the granting of privileges to industrialists, the expansion of trade relations with other countries, and several other measures demonstrate that the Islamic Emirate is serious about this objective.

A review of citizens' views shows that they are hopeful for the future and expect that, as a result of the efforts of the Islamic Emirate, the country will achieve self-sufficiency in many areas in the near future. # **Economic Policy of the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan Approved**



#### Introduction

For economic growth and development in any country, the existence of a clear and comprehensive economic policy is essential. Afghanistan, emerging from several decades of conflict, requires policies that not only align with Islamic values but also address the country's real needs and, on that basis, foster economic growth and development. A policy of this nature has been approved by the Economic Commission under the Office of the Deputy Prime Minister for Economic Affairs, which provides clear guidelines for the coordination of economic activities and the effective utilization of resources.

The regular meeting of the Economic Commission, chaired by the Deputy Prime Minister for Economic Affairs, Honorable Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund, was held on June 22, 2025 at Marmarin Palace. In the meeting, the Economic Policy of the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan was presented for discussion and, following comprehensive assessment, was approved.

The vision of the policy is: "A developed and prosperous Afghanistan based on the Islamic economic system."

Its objectives are: creating a favorable environment for attracting and expanding investment, increasing domestic production and exports, raising employment levels and reducing poverty,

ensuring sustainable economic growth and development, and strengthening economic stability, prosperity, and Islamic social justice.

The economic policy will play an important role in coordinating economic activities, optimizing the use of resources, and supporting the private sector.

Furthermore, in the meeting it was decided that the remaining works of the electricity network extension project for 13 villages in the Pul-e-Khumri district of Baghlan province will be financed and completed from the internal budget of Da Afghanistan Breshna Sherkat.

At the end of the meeting, the proposal to construct a commercial market on the land of the Ministry of Guidance, Hajj, and Endowments in Balkh province was approved. According to this plan, the private sector will invest 740 million Afghanis in building an eight-story commercial market, which will contain a total of 878 shops. Likewise, the proposal for constructing a commercial market on municipal land in Sar-e-Pul province was also approved. Under this plan, the private sector will invest 96 million Afghanis to build a standard commercial market.

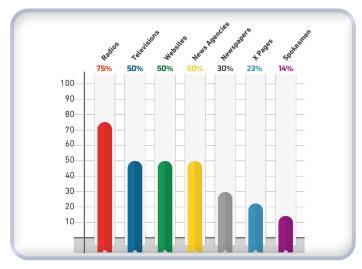

Considering the above numbers, the percentage of positive opinions is higher in state-owned media compared to private media. State-owned media have 96% positive opinions, whereas private media have 90%. The percentage of negative opinions is higher in private media as state-owned media. When combining positive, negative opinions, and constructive suggestions from both media types, we get a total of 694 positive opinions, 27 negative opinions, and 14 constructive suggestions, resulting in:

## An Analysis of Public Opinion in the Media and on Social Networks: Key Findings

**First:** A number of citizens have commented that the strength of a country's economic system is linked to its economic policy. Indeed, the reality is that if a country has a sound and effective economic policy, its entire economic affairs will be organized and well-coordinated. In view of this principle, and to further improve the coordination of economic affairs in the country, the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan developed an economic policy. This economic policy will contribute to the improvement and advancement of the country's economic affairs, create employment opportunities, and accelerate the functioning of the national economic cycle. The policy is comprehensive and covers all aspects of the system, and with its implementation, Afghanistan, by the grace of Almighty Allah, will take rapid steps toward economic stability and prosperity, leading the nation to progress.

> Second: Some citizens have raised concerns regarding the shortage of electricity. They have stated that the lack of sufficient power during the summer is a major problem and that electricity can solve many issues. Indeed, the need for electricity is particularly acute during the summer, when people in hot regions face significant challenges. The Islamic Emirate is striving to increase the level of electricity generation by utilizing domestic resources. Several solar, wind, and hydropower projects are under development, which, once completed, will increase electricity supply in the country to a certain extent. This will not only address citizens' electricity needs during the summer but also provide greater power to industrial factories, which will, in turn, contribute to the country's economic growth. The Islamic Emirate seeks to gradually reduce reliance on imported electricity, but this process requires time, as electricity generation and distribution cannot be accomplished rapidly in a short period. Therefore, citizens are urged to be patient and allow the Islamic Emirate

time to move forward according to its plans and to wait for the completion of ongoing electricity generation projects. Once these projects are completed, the country's electricity capacity will rise, and citizens, by the grace of Allah Almighty, will enjoy improved living conditions.

Third: A number of citizens have complained about the existence of unemployment in the country and have called for programs to eliminate unemployment and create job opportunities. Unemployment does exist in the country. The Islamic Emirate acknowledges that unemployment is a problem, but it has not remained idle. For the past four years, it has been working to address this issue, implementing various programs and planning additional ones. At present, thousands of citizens have been employed in various projects across different sectors, and efforts continue to expand these opportunities further and to reduce the level of unemployment in the country.

#### Conclusion

For better coordination and management of economic affairs in the country, it was necessary to develop a policy. The Office of the Deputy PM for Economic Affairs undertook this effort and formulated an economic policy. With the implementation of this policy, national resources will be better utilized, and the economic system will move toward improvement.

Some citizens have expressed concerns about electricity shortages and have requested the creation of employment opportunities. The Islamic Emirate is aware of these challenges and is working to address them. In recent years, through the attraction of domestic and foreign investment, projects have been launched in the electricity sector, which will help alleviate the problem of electricity shortages to some extent. These projects have already created job opportunities for many citizens, and further efforts are underway to generate more employment and reduce unemployment levels.

## Participation of the Deputy PM for Economic Affairs in the ECO Summit



#### Introduction

The 17th Summit of the Economic Cooperation Organization (ECO) was held in the city of Khankendi, Republic of Azerbaijan, from July 3–4. The Deputy PM for Economic Affairs of the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan, Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund, traveled to the Republic of Azerbaijan to participate in the summit.

During the summit, Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund held meetings with a number of presidents, vice presidents, ministers, and other officials, discussing Afghanistan's economic opportunities, regional connectivity, and investment.

In his remarks, the Deputy PM called for the activation of the Lapis Lazuli Corridor, which connects Afghanistan with Europe and is considered an important regional project for trade. He invited ECO member states to invest in Afghanistan's energy, agriculture, mining, industry, and infrastructure sectors and to share their experiences with Afghanistan. Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund urged the members of the ECO Summit to take steps toward recognizing Afghanistan just like the Russian Federation and to recognize the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan. Furthermore, he proposed that the next ECO Summit be convened in Kabul.

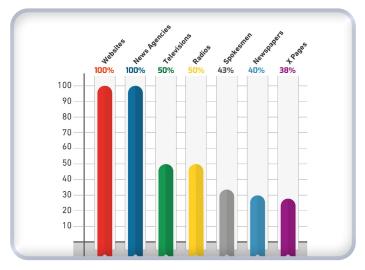

When combining positive, negative opinions, and constructive suggestions from both media types, we get a total of 6763 positive opinions, 1250 negative opinions, and 322 constructive suggestions, resulting in:

Such presences are valuable moves towards legitimacy, progress, and political stability.
- Honorable Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund! Your efforts are commendable. May Allah grant that you return to the country with great achievements.
- The request of the Deputy PM for Economic Affairs is an important and national step. Requesting recognition from ECO member states not only creates the ground for the expansion of Afghanistan's economic relations, but also carries fundamental significance for internal stability, investment, trade, and the improvement of people's livelihoods. Such requests must be accompanied by mutual respect, confidence-building, and

- clear cooperation in order to gain international trust and ensure the protection of the fundamental rights of Afghans.
- The recognition of the caretaker government of the Islamic Emirate by the Russian Federation is an important and historic step that opens a new chapter in relations between Afghanistan and Russia. This decision demonstrates that regional engagement is evolving.
- Only promises are being made, but practical steps have not yet been taken. Promises alone
  cannot benefit the people and the country. What is necessary is the implementation of
  words into action so that the nation and the people may truly benefit.

## An Analysis of Public Opinion in the Media and on Social Networks: Key Findings

- > First, the majority of citizens, in their comments, considered the participation of the Deputy PM for Economic Affairs in the Economic Cooperation Organization (ECO) Summit as a positive step and evaluated it as beneficial for Afghanistan. The Islamic Emirate's participation in the ECO was significant for the expansion of Afghanistan's economic cooperation. A number of strong regional economies are members of this organization, and Afghanistan's closer engagement with them is important for the country's economy. For example, projects such as the Lapis Lazuli Corridor, the TAPI project, the CASA-1000 project, and others are initiatives whose implementation, through interaction and closer relations with ECO member states, will benefit Afghanistan's economy, create employment opportunities, and strengthen the Islamic Emirate's ties with those countries. This visit was full of achievements, and we witnessed that immediately after its conclusion, Kazakhstan announced an investment of USD 500 million in a railway project. During this visit, commitments and pledges of cooperation were made which, once implemented, will generate economic dynamism in Afghanistan.
- ➤ **Second,** many citizens, in their comments, considered the recognition of the Islamic Emirate by Russia as a positive step. Indeed, Russia's recognition of the Islamic Emirate will bring political and economic benefits for Afghanistan. This recognition was granted at a time when a delegation of the Islamic Emirate, led by the Deputy PM for Economic Affairs, Honorable Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund, was in Baku, the capital of Azerbaijan, to participate in the ECO Summit. The Deputy PM also requested recognition from other countries. Recognition of the Islamic Emirate by states will expand Afghanistan's political and economic relations with them, create opportunities for trade and greater investment, and further strengthen Afghanistan's status and position in regional and international politics. Russia's recognition of the Islamic Emirate is due to its economy-focused, non-interference, and domestic political stability policies, and this approach will also compel

- other countries to recognize the Islamic Emirate.
- > **Third,** some citizens, in their comments, criticized that the Islamic Emirate makes promises but does not take practical steps. However, if we look closely, the Islamic Emirate has fulfilled its commitments to the people. In the economic field alone, the promises made have been implemented. Important steps have been taken towards economic self-reliance. Currently, Afghanistan has achieved self-reliance in 130 sectors, with efforts underway to increase this number. In addition, numerous national projects have been launched within the country to promote economic prosperity and growth. The major Qosh Tepa Canal project, electricity generation projects, the construction of roads to strengthen internal connectivity and trade, and other development initiatives are examples of projects undertaken by the Islamic Emirate for the growth of the country's economy. Efforts have been made to attract investment, and both domestic and foreign investments have been realized across various sectors. Moreover, efforts have been pursued for regional connectivity. The TAPI project, railway initiatives, and many other projects are being implemented under the Islamic Emirate's economy-focused policy. There may indeed be challenges in certain areas. # MoU Signed on the Torghundi-Herat Railway Project with an Investment of USD 500 Million



#### Introduction

The Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan is committed to expanding trade in the country and connecting it with both near and distant regional neighbors. Since Afghanistan is landlocked, the development of overland transport is considered the only viable option. Railways are among the most convenient, fast, and cost-effective means of land transportation. For this reason, the Islamic Emirate is focusing on the expansion of railway networks to increase the volume, speed, and affordability of Afghanistan's exports and imports. In this context, an MoU was signed with Kazakhstan on the Torghundi–Herat Railway Project at the Arg.

On July 10, 2025, the Deputy PM for Economic Affairs, Honorable Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund, met at the Arg with Kazakhstan's Deputy PM and Minister of Foreign Affairs, Mr. Murat Nurtleu. During the meeting, both sides discussed trade, transit, railways, banking, and economic cooperation.

Honorable Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund described Afghanistan—Kazakhstan relations as positive and progressing, emphasizing that the Islamic Emirate is working to expand those areas of cooperation that will contribute to Afghanistan's prosperity and development.

The Deputy PM assured the Kazakh side that Afghanistan, as an effective transit corridor, can provide Kazakhstan the opportunity to transmit its energy to South Asia through Afghan territory.

The Honorable Deputy PM also noted that both countries could make better use of existing opportunities and cooperate in the fields of mining, transport, telecommunications, energy production, oil and gas, and major infrastructure projects.

During the meeting, discussions were held on the signing of a quarantine agreement on agricultural products, increasing exports and imports through the railway, signing an agreement on international transport and transit between the two countries, joint cooperation between Afghanistan, Iran, Kazakhstan, and Turkmenistan in the industrial, commercial, and transport sectors, the opening of major trade centers in both countries, and the reduction of transit fees. Once implemented, these measures will raise the volume of trade between the two countries to USD 3 billion.

Following this, Kazakhstan's Deputy PM and Minister of Foreign Affairs, Murat Nurtleu, addressed the meeting. He stated that Kazakhstan continues to support Afghanistan on the international stage and sees favorable opportunities for closer cooperation and joint work between the two countries in various areas. He further announced that Kazakhstan is ready to begin investment worth USD 500 million in the Torghundi—Herat Railway Project. He also expressed readiness to increase electricity exports to Afghanistan, facilitate the export of Afghan agricultural products to Kazakh markets, and allow Afghan banks to open accounts in Kazakhstan's Freedom Bank and Zaman Bank.

The Deputy PM for Economic Affairs welcomed Kazakhstan's investment in the Torghundi–Herat Railway Project, describing it as an important step towards enhancing transit and trade between the two countries.

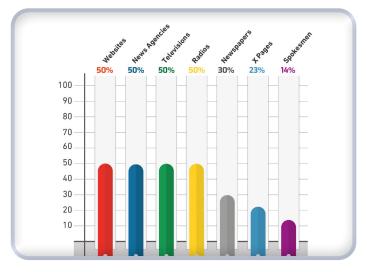

## The collective percentage of people's comments on private and state media:



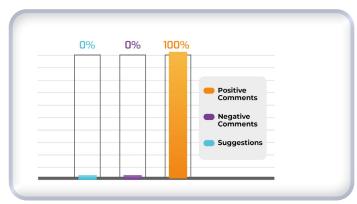

The deployment of workers to Qatar was the beginning of this process. The Islamic Emirate also intends to send skilled and professional Afghans to other countries for work. In this regard, discussions have been held with a number of countries, and agreements are expected to be reached soon.

- > Third, some citizens have described the deployment of Afghan workers to Qatar as a great service, as workers are now able to go abroad for employment through legal channels. The adversities of the past several decades forced many Afghans to use illegal and smuggling routes to seek work and livelihood abroad. These illegal routes involved severe risks, and in some cases, Afghans even lost their lives. In order to ensure that Afghan workers travel abroad through legal and secure means, the Islamic Emirate launched this process to prevent such risks, so that Afghans may go abroad for work lawfully rather than through illegal or smuggling routes. Serious efforts are also being made to safeguard the rights of Afghan workers in host countries, ensuring that they enjoy the same rights as others and do not face any difficulties.

#### Conclusion

The deployment of skilled and professional Afghan workers to Qatar by the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan has been praised by the general public and is considered a positive step toward reducing the unemployment rate in the country. The Islamic Emirate is striving to create domestic job opportunities for all citizens; however, since it is not possible for all citizens to be employed within the country, alternative solutions were considered, one of which was sending workers abroad. This process began with Qatar, and it is expected that Afghan workers will also be sent to other countries in the future.

# Launch of a 40-Megawatt Solar Power Generation Project in Logar Province



#### Introduction

Electricity is a vital requirement for the comprehensive development of any country. Access to electricity improves the quality of life, expands industrial activities, and consequently creates employment opportunities. For this reason, the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan has paid special attention to electricity generation. In recent times, based on agreements between the Islamic Emirate and the private sector, several power generation projects have been initiated in order to utilize national resources on the one hand and meet the country's electricity demand on the other.

On July 31, 2025, Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund, Deputy PM for Economic Affairs, inaugurated the construction works of a 40-megawatt solar power generation project in Mohammad Agha district of Logar province.

Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund described the launch of this project as an important opportunity for the economic development of Logar province and Afghanistan as a whole. He stated that upon completion of these projects, electricity shortages in Logar province will be alleviated to some extent, industrial activities will expand, and numerous job opportunities will

be created for citizens. The Deputy PM noted that with the implementation of these projects, economic activity in Logar province will increase and the electricity shortage of Mohammad Agha Industrial Park will also be resolved.

He emphasized that electricity is a critical necessity for the progress of nations and cited the lack of sufficient electricity as one of the factors behind Afghanistan's underdevelopment. He further stated that Afghanistan possesses vast energy resources, but unfortunately, these resources have not been properly utilized, resulting in the country's dependence on imported electricity and the annual outflow of hundreds of millions of dollars to other countries.

He highlighted that with the re-establishment of the Islamic Emirate, significant progress has been made in the energy sector alongside other sectors, including the initiation of renewable energy projects in various provinces. In addition to energy generation, projects related to electricity distribution, regulation, provision of energy to industrial zones, and supply to citizens are also underway.

Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund reiterated the Islamic Emirate's firm determination to achieve self-sufficiency in energy. He underlined that Afghanistan not only has the capacity to produce electricity sufficient for domestic needs but also has the potential to export surplus electricity to other countries. However, to achieve this, proper water management and effective utilization of solar and wind resources are essential, for which the Islamic Emirate is working on long-term plans.

He also urged the contracted company to ensure high construction quality and complete the project within the stipulated timeframe.

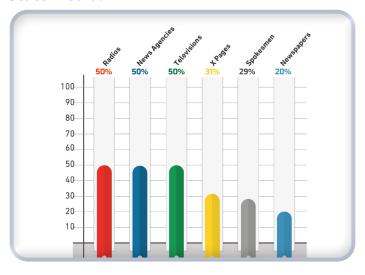
This project, being implemented in Mohammad Agha district of Logar province, consists of two components: the establishment of a 40-megawatt solar power generation facility with a cost of USD 28 million, and the construction of a 126 MVA substation along with the installation of transmission lines, costing USD 7.6 million. The project is expected to be completed within 18 months, supplying electricity to 40,000 households in the region and resolving the electricity shortage of Mohammad Agha Industrial Park.

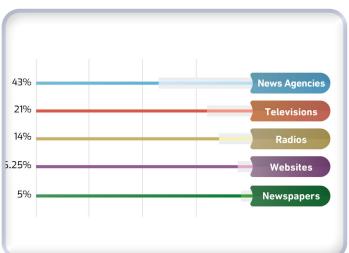

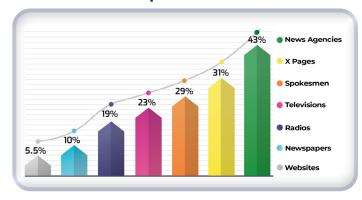

## The collective percentage of people's comments on private and state media:



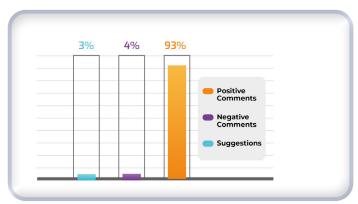

- Priority should be given to the construction of hydropower dams. Afghanistan has abundant water resources, and much of it flows away unused.
- This is a very good initiative. Public welfare projects should be implemented in all provinces.

# An Analysis of Public Opinion in the Media and on Social Networks: Key Findings

- First, a number of citizens have stated that although electricity projects are being launched in the country, the problem of electricity shortage still exists in Kabul city. Indeed, Kabul faces electricity shortages, but the root of the problem goes back to the past, when little attention was paid to domestic electricity generation and reliance was placed on imported electricity. More than 70 percent of our electricity is imported from neighboring countries. This is the reason we do not have sufficient indigenous electricity, and imported power is occasionally cut off due to various issues, leaving our people and industrial parks without adequate supply and creating challenges. The Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan seeks to find a fundamental solution to the electricity problem and reduce dependence on foreign power. For this purpose, it has paid greater attention to domestic electricity generation so that national resources are utilized and reliance on imported power is gradually reduced. As a result of producing electricity from our own sources, self-sufficiency will eventually be achieved. However, this requires patience, since the completion of projects takes time. Citizens must remain patient until the ongoing projects are finalized.
- Second, some citizens have said that attention should also be given to wind energy generation. Afghanistan has significant wind power potential. Herat, Farah, Nimroz, and several other provinces possess high capacity for wind energy. The Islamic Emirate has considered wind energy projects as well. Recently, a major wind power project was inaugurated in Herat province. That was only the beginning. With the grace of Almighty Allah, proper use will also be made of this capacity, and further electricity generation projects will be launched. Other citizens have called for the construction of dams. The Islamic Emirate has placed water management among its top priorities. Work has already begun on numerous dams for agriculture and electricity generation, and those currently in planning will commence in the near future. The Islamic Emirate intends to manage the country's water resources properly and ensure their effective utilization.
- Third, some citizens have said that such projects should be implemented in all provinces. The Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan is the representative government of all Afghans and strives to ensure balanced development throughout the country so that development projects are implemented equally nationwide. We observe that across the country, construction work on roads, dams, canals, solar power generation projects, and other initiatives is underway. The Islamic Emirate seeks progress across the entirety of Afghanistan, as the development of any part of the country contributes to the overall advancement of Afghanistan and positively impacts the national economy.

#### Conclusion

The 40-megawatt solar power project in Logar province is an important initiative for improving the economic situation of the local population. It will increase economic activities in the region and enhance the quality of life for residents.

Some citizens have voiced concerns about electricity shortages in Kabul, but the Islamic Emirate is working on a fundamental solution to this problem: generating electricity from domestic resources so that reliance on imported power is gradually reduced, outages are eliminated, and the country achieves self-sufficiency in the energy sector.

# Inauguration of a Raisin Processing Factory with an Annual Capacity of 10,000 Tons



#### Introduction

Afghanistan is an agricultural country, and the vast majority of its citizens are engaged in farming. Every year, thousands of tons of fresh and dried fruits are produced, part of which is exported to other countries. Afghanistan produces high-quality and diverse varieties of grapes, which are processed into different types of raisins. To ensure that these raisins are processed properly and delivered in a standardized form to domestic and international markets, an organized plan and structured operations are required. For this purpose, a raisin processing factory has been established by the private sector in the Estalef district of Kabul province.

On July 30, 2025, the Deputy PM for Economic Affairs, Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund, attended the inauguration ceremony of the raisin processing factory in Estalef district. He described the commencement of this factory's operations as an important step in enhancing the value of agricultural products. He emphasized that this initiative will stimulate the regional economy, improve the quality of exports, and create hundreds of jobs, thereby making a significant contribution to Afghanistan's economic growth.

The Deputy PM further stated that, alongside other sectors, the Islamic Emirate has also given special attention to agriculture. In pursuit of developing the agricultural economy, multiple

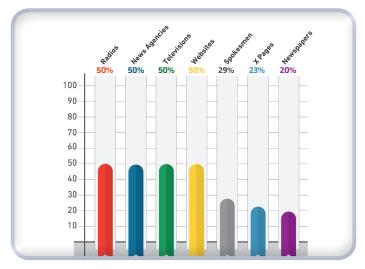

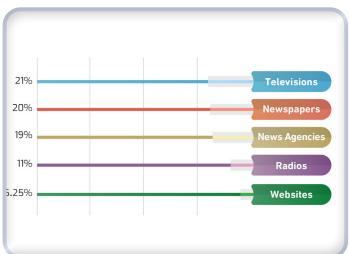

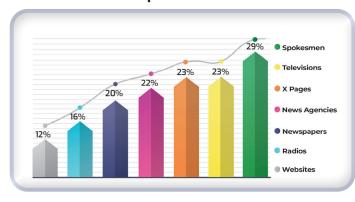

## The collective percentage of people's comments on private and state media:



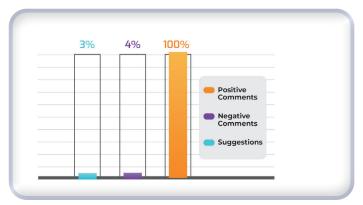

# Signing of Memorandum of Understanding for 10,000 MW Power Generation in Afghanistan with \$10 Billion Investment



#### Introduction

Electricity is essential for the country's industrial development and for improving the living standards of the population. In past decades, Afghanistan has not fully utilized its electricity generation resources. This has resulted in dependency on other countries for electricity, with a large portion being imported. Since the re-establishment of the Islamic Emirate, investment opportunities have been created across various sectors, and both domestic and foreign investors have invested in the electricity sector.

In the presence of the Deputy PM for Economic Affairs, Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund, a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed on August 2, 2025, at the Government Media and Information Center between the Ministry of Water and Energy and Azizi Energy Private Company for the production, transmission, and distribution of 10,000 megawatts of electricity with an investment of \$10 billion.

During the signing ceremony, the CEO of Azizi Energy Private Company, Merwis Azizi, stated that, in cooperation and support of the Islamic Emirate, the company has strong determination and full commitment to this investment, and implementation will begin immediately.

Azizi Energy Private Company will generate 10,000 megawatts of electricity across various regions of the country using gas, coal, water, wind, and solar energy. Within 7 to 10 years, Afghanistan will achieve full self-sufficiency in electricity generation and will also be able to export electricity to other countries. Of the 10,000 megawatts, 4,000 MW will be allocated for general public consumption, while 6,000 MW will be reserved for industrial factories. This will enable the establishment of thousands of new factories, create employment opportunities for millions of Afghans, and significantly advance the country's economy.

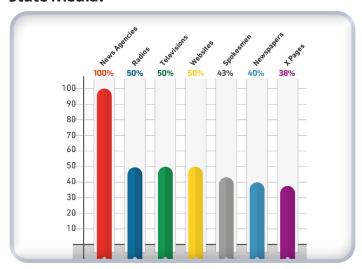
Following the signing of this MoU, technical teams from the Ministry of Water and Energy and Azizi Energy Private Company will visit the relevant regions, complete surveys within ten days, and prepare designs over the next six months. After six months, the first phase of projects generating 2,000 to 3,000 megawatts of electricity will commence.

At present, Afghanistan, alongside other sectors, is in great need of investment in the energy sector, as the country is facing a shortage of electricity. This shortage has cast a shadow over industrial activity nationwide. When a country has abundant electricity, industrial activities flourish, which in turn leads to job creation and industrialization. The production of 10,000 megawatts of electricity by the private company Azizi Energy is a promising development for the country, and its implementation will accelerate economic growth and generate many job opportunities.
- > **Second**, some citizens have expressed in their views that if Afghanistan achieves self-sufficiency in electricity, on the one hand, payments for imported electricity to other countries will stop, and on the other hand, surplus electricity can be exported. Indeed, Afghanistan has the capacity to generate more electricity than it requires domestically. If the production of 10,000 megawatts of electricity by Azizi Energy is realized, along with the completion of a number of other electricity projects, Afghanistan will not only eliminate its current dependence on imported electricity from neighboring countries but will also gain the ability to export surplus electricity. There are countries in our region with extremely high electricity demands. On this basis, Afghanistan will be able to sell its surplus electricity to other countries and generate significant revenues.

Afghanistan has many rivers and abundant water resources, but in the past, these have not been properly utilized. # Mullah Abdul Ghani Baradar Akhund Inaugurates the Pashdan Dam

### National Procurement Commission Approves Six Projects Worth 828 Million Afghanis
